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Introduction

UNIC is an alliance of eight universities and cities, which aims to develop a new model of European inter-institutional teaching and research infrastructure built upon interrogating and addressing the issues facing post-industrial cities, particularly issues of inclusion and diversity. UNIC has a distinct focus on engaged research, which builds upon our strategic advantage as an alliance of research-intensive universities and city partners with experience in issues of post-industrial transitions and collaboration with society.

One of our goals within UNIC4ER is to develop a common framework and supportive systems for involving and engaging citizens, civil society, public & city authorities and academia in joint research and innovation initiatives. Towards this ambition, the Engaged Strategy Forum, among other things, enables the development a common mapping strategy for engaged research and a common understanding of engaged research towards an engaged research strategy document and a draft *Declaration on Engaged Research*, in advance of signing by our eight UNIC University Presidents and City Leaders on the 15th of June 2022 in Oulu, Finland.

COVID-19 concerns prevented an anticipated physical gathering, thus the Engaged Research Strategy Forum pivoted to a hybrid model with:

- 4 virtual workshops that took place online on 18th- 19th January 2022 and
- a physical meeting convening City and University stakeholders on 30th-31st of March 2022.

This report documents workshop proceedings and other essential information on the Engaged Research Strategy Forum and will serve as the required deliverable for UNIC4ER Tasks 2.1.



Overview

Why?

The UNIC Strategy Forum on Engaged Research brings together UNIC European University Colleagues and City Partners for a series of workshops towards developing a common strategy, framework and supportive systems for involving and engaging citizens, civil society, public & city authorities and academia in joint research and innovation initiatives. We are using the term 'Engaged Research' as an overarching guiding principle or an umbrella term that describes research approaches that have a common interest in collaborative inquiry with society and having the purpose of achieving social change and social justice either directly or indirectly.

What?

The forum consists of a series of events designed to:

- Strategically align UNIC4ER Engaged Research and UNIC Erasmus+ CityLabs initiative work plans and ambitions
- Map engaged research policies and practices within and across UNIC institutions,
- Learn from engaged research best practices,
- Contribute to the development of a common understanding of engaged research.
- Engage City Partners in dialogue on the societal challenges facing their municipalities and regions and
- Participate in conversation and dialogue focused on how we can address and partner with our cities to confront the challenges facing European postindustrial municipalities and regions.

Summary of Session 1

The UNIC4ER Strategy Forum was launched by University College Cork and Dr Martin Galvin presented an overview of the Strategy Forum and its overarching aims and objectives.


The theme of this workshop was the UNIC4ER Taskforce meets with UNIC Work Package 5 Coordinators to envision strategic alignment of UNIC4ER Engaged Research and CityLabs work plans and ambitions. This session was divided into four sections and raw Mentimeter data for each section are presented in the Appendix.

- 1. An introduction to Engaged Research which worked towards a shared view on Engaged Research as challenge-based research. A diversity of research strategies and methodologies were considered along with data collection, target groups and GDPR. The Mentimeter platform was used to collect participant input which was displayed in real time to facilitate direct discussion. Participants were asked: What would you like to discuss about Engaged Research?
- 2. An introduction and discussion of *UNIC4ER Meets the City* and a thematic framework based on the EU Urban Agenda. This included a hand-on work within an Excel spreadsheet template to transfer information from UNIC CityLabs Roadmap to UNIC4ER WP4 Local Engaged Research Roadmap. A truncated version of the EU Urban Agenda was presented to examine relevance and implications. Participants were asked: What would you like to discuss about the Engaged Research Roadmaps? Additionally, they were asked: What themes were missing from the presented UNIC4ER Meets the City thematic framework? The information transferred from UNIC CityLabs VMP themes to UNIC4ER WP4 Local Engaged Research Roadmaps preparation included:
 - Key actors' and their roles,
 - Key actors' contact information and preferences for contacting and
 - Each key actors' main interests
 - CityLabs coordinators' experiences and tips on contacting their city



The figure below was presented in this segment to provide participants with the motivation for information transfer.

- UNIC4ER ER Taskforce will design the UNIC4ER Meets the City framework (T4.2) for Engaged Research between universities, our cities and their citizens
- Collaborative engaged research initiatives will be developed around Local Engaged Research Roadmaps, which will be regularly updated
- To engage transdisciplinary research, development and innovation projects that include cities as project partners and involve citizens in research activities





• Summary of Session 2


This interactive and collaborative workshop was conducted via Zoom and divided into two segments. The goal of the workshop was to agree a common approach to mapping exercises amongst work packages.

Part A examined various mapping deliverable for UNIC4ER which included opportunities, challenges, common methodologies and overcoming common challenges. This session began with representative from each work package sharing short 5-minute presentations articulating their (1) particular mapping task, (2) what they proposed to map and (3) their proposed methodology. Next, participants were divided into breakout groups and asked to:

- Identify commonalities and interrelatedness of mapping tasks.
- Share their views on opportunities and challenges related to mapping tasks.

Participant input their responses into Google Jamboard which will be sorted and grouped to examine emergent themes. The raw data is presented in the Appendix.

The following figure describes the various UNIC4ER mapping deliverable and illustrates their interrelated nature






Part B examined mapping approaches considered by each Work Package with the aim of codeveloping a meta framework for mapping by building on the learning from the Part A. This was again followed by 2 breakout groups and delegates were asked to consider if the needs of the different work packages were met by this approach? The following questions were asked in the jamboards and the raw data can also be found in the Appendix:

- Is there a need to add or modify headings to assist downstream work packages?
- Is this format adequate for WP-6 given that all work packages mapping data eventually feeds the Pulse Dashboard?
- How can we work with common data gathering methods and language?



Summary of Session 3

Each UNIC4ER Taskforce member was asked to nominate suitable best practice cases. A second showcase event 'Learning from Engaged Research Best Practice (Part II)' will be run on 30th March 2022. Formal presentations showcased best practice of Engaged Research from across the UNIC consortium and presenters shared their practice insights during the subsequent Panel Discussion. UNIC4ER aims to deliver on key UNIC goals of involving and engaging citizens, civil society and public/city partners in the co-production of research and innovation. This Showcase event was public and open to all and widely attended by individuals across the consortium with over 150 registrants. The following presentations were featured:

- 1. Ageing Well in Post-Industrial Territories
 - Dr Catherine Elsen, University of Liege, InterAct Research Lab

This engaged research exemplar was led by a multidisciplinary team and used Design Methods to address the issue of ageing well in Liege, with a focus on housing, anticipation of aging well and perception of older people in society. The presentation asked: (1) What does it mean to age well in a city with a rich industrial past? And (2) How do the histories of each individual link together and reflect on today's realities? UNIC CityLabs Challenge: Aging Population

- 2. Mobile Futures: Diversity, Trust, and Two-Way Integration Dr Johanna Hiitola, University of Oulu, Gender Studies
 - Mobile Futures is an interdisciplinary, action-oriented engaged research exemplar that seeks to make a scientific and societal contribution to co-creating a fair and inclusive Finnish society. To achieve this goal, the project employs the Living Lab methodology, through which solutions are jointly developed by the project researchers and societal partners.
 - UNIC CityLabs Challenge: Diversity and Inclusion.
- 3. New Habitats for Human Development
 - Dr Roberto San Salvador del Valle, University of Deusto, Cities Lab Katedra This presentation discussed the 360° Cities Model and the KAIA Method (learning, research & action) pioneered by Deusto Cities Lab. It offered a vision of an urban model that is based on the creativity of everyone, and that is interrelated with other dimensions (competitiveness, cohesion and compactness) to form a collaborative city. - 4. Microbiome Study of Irish Travellers




Professor Fergus Shanahan, University College Cork, APC Microbiome Ireland This presentation asked: "What is a normal or desirable microbiome in an ethnically diverse society?" This Public Patient Involvement (PPI) represents the shared efforts of clinicians and scientists working in partnership with the insight, wisdom and input of Cork Traveller Community who not only participated in the study but also shaped its design and planning. These findings had global implications and are published in the prestigious journal Nature Medicine.

UNIC CityLabs Challenge: Health and Wellbeing

The subsequent panel discussion addressed many aspects of the Engaged Research process such as assessing short- and long-term impacts, the early stages of developing an Engaged Research project, and gaining trust with community partners and keeping true to the commitments made to those partners.

Session 4 - Co-Producing a Common Understanding of Engaged Research

The process began with a critical, interdisciplinary discussion within the eight institutions about what engaged research is, as well as the methods by which it can be implemented across the consortium. The co-production of a common understanding is critical to the development and delivery of a Joint UNIC4ER Declaration on Engaged Research.

• Summary of Session 4

This interactive and collaborative workshop was conducted via Zoom and divided into two segments.

Part A focused on co-producing a definition of Engaged Research. After an icebreaker where participants were asked to enter *what engaged research meant to them*, they were assigned to breakout groups where they input their thoughts and ideas into Google Jamboards for the following questions:

- What are the key factors and considerations to include in a definition of Engaged Research? What are shared key principles and values to include in a definition of Engaged Research?
- What are the Opportunities & Challenges to building a common understanding of Engaged Research?
- Who are the stakeholders to include in building a common understanding of Engaged Research? How can we best engage them?

The raw Google Jamboard data can be found in the Appendix.

Part B had the theme of co-producing a common practice and policy approach to Engaged Research. Delegates were two distinct tasks related to practice and policy.

- Task -1: Understanding Engaged Research at the Practice Level
 - Discuss diverse approaches, methods, and supportive frameworks (RRI, Open Science, etc).
 - What are the common elements in the design and delivery of Engaged Research?
- Task -2: Understanding Engaged Research at the Policy, Institution and Societal Engagement Level
 - Discuss enabling policy, institutional and societal supports (e.g, CPD, funding, promotional criteria and assessment frameworks).
 - What are the common needed policies, institutional and societal supports?

There was also a supplemental session (facilitator Sari Hirvonen-Kantola, UOULU) at the end of Session 4 that was intended to gather input from Vice-Rectors or Directors of Research from each institution on principles for utilizing UNIC Conference and CityLabs Festivals (Oulu, June 2022) as a platform for preparing engaged research project proposals:

- Should the proposal be selected by (1) each university internally, (2) with their partner city or (3) by UNIC?


Question 2 - Consortium building

- How do we ensure that there will not be just same old partnerships?


Question 3 - Some UNIC4ER funds have been earmarked to support project proposal preparation
